The Birth of Dry Houses in Kitchener-Waterloo

Gary knows first-hand that upon graduation from an addictions treatment program, graduates face the difficult decision of where to live. This decision has a dramatic impact on the future of their sobriety. In the absence of a safe place that will support their recovery, some end up returning to the very environments that they removed themselves from in search of freedom. Left to integrate back into their community with little to no support, in time many individuals succumb to their former lifestyle of addiction.

This unmet need for local transitional housing birthed a vision within Clarence, an Intensive Housing Support Worker at House of Friendship. As one who has previously lived with and felt the pain of addictions and homelessness himself, Clarence's personal journey helped him recognize this significant gap in our community. He began to advocate for post-treatment housing that would help men, like Gary.

This vision became reality thanks to community partners including The Working Centre, a KW Community Foundation generous donor, and Stirling Avenue Mennonite Church who renovated three of their homes

beside the church to repurpose them as Dry Houses for men. Here men are allowed to stay in a home that is free of drugs and alcohol, for up to a year post-treatment. During this time they are individually supported by a Support Worker who walks with them in their journey of finding belonging in this community, whether through completing their education, acquiring independent living skills, or finding stable employment. "Living here has been a constant support to maintain my sobriety" reflects Gary.


While the first men's Dry House in Kitchener opened in July 2013, today there are three Dry Houses which provide 9 bedrooms for gentlemen. Additionally, Emmanuel United Church (Waterloo) is renovating a duplex on their property which will become a Dry house for 6 women called Vera's Place. Coming from no Dry Houses just three years ago, by the end of 2016 there will be 15 beds in KW!



I know first-hand what these gentlemen, like Gary (*Dry Houses*, page 1), are experiencing after they graduate from addictions treatment. They need a safe and

clean home within a supportive environment. The need is great to have someone walk alongside of you - to challenge you, check up on you and cheer you on.

I needed that in my life as I journeyed through homelessness and addictions recovery. Having lost so much as a young boy who grew up in foster care, I struggled with the pain of not understanding why I did not have parents, why I was not wanted, why I was always labelled the "foster child", and why I didn't belong to anyone or anywhere. My introduction to alcohol as an eight year old became my drug of choice to numb this anguish. As a teenager, I progressed to drugs and made poor choices in

search for where I could belong. My journey of addiction and homelessness took me into adulthood when, though I was a functioning addict with a family and home of my own, in my brokenness I chose drugs and alcohol over my family.

When I eventually found myself at *House of Friendship*'s **Charles Street Men**'s **Shelter**, the support I received from the staff was the pivotal turning point for me. This was followed by completing House of Friendship's **174 King Street North** men's addiction treatment program which became the foundation of my sobriety.

House of Friendship walks with those in need to embrace, empower and equip them for life.
